RESOLUTIONS UPON THE STATE OF THE COUNTRY.

The following resolutions upon the state of the country, which passed the House of Representatives on the 13th inst., will tend to embody all the amendments to the original draft revised and adopted by the late session of the Legislature—the original being the only correct copy yet given to the press:

Adopted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met. That our institutions are assailed by an rebellion on one side, which is led by the sword, and on the other unconstitutional acts of Congress and usurpations of power by the Executive, which we have seen by experience can be corrected by the ballot-box, as well as by principle requires that people shall await the process of rebellion which is slow but sure, and refrain from any unlawful and unconstitutional measures which have already brought terrible灾害 upon the country, whilst they aid the aid of all patriotic men to ascertain the evils that threaten our institutions.

Twelfth. That this General Assembly condemns and denounces the faults of the administration and the encroachments of the Abolitionists; it does also most thoroughly condemn and denounce the heresy of secession as unwarranted by the Constitution and destructive alike of the security and perpetuity of the Government and of the peace and liberty of the people of this State are unalterably opposed to any division of the Union, and will persistently exert their whole influence and power under the Constitution to maintain and defend it.

Thirteenth. That the laws of the State must be maintained and enforced, and that it is the duty of the constituted authorities of the State to see to it that, by all constitutional means, this indispensable end shall be attained.

Fourteenth. That copies of these resolutions be forwarded to the President of the United States, to the Governors of the several States, acknowledging the Federal authority, and to our Senators and Representatives in Congress.
