

The Riot.

New York, July 17.—The placard posted about the streets last night, representing persons to congregate this afternoon at Archbishop Hughes' residence, was an unmitigated and senseless hoax.

From the military movements which have been quietly made this morning, there will be but little opportunity for the rioters to carry on their hellish designs to-day.

Nearly every house for three or four blocks, on both sides of the street, were filled with a mob, who fired bullets, stones and other deadly missiles upon the soldiers.

Eleven members of the 5th company of the 7th Regiment are reported to have been killed by stones and brickbats.

Twenty-five rioters were captured last night, on the west side of the town, and the police were continually bringing them in.

The outrages on the negroes which have taken place the last few days made this city a place of torment and death for negroes as much to be deplored.

There is no question that the rioters were not only individually but collectively responsible for the present unhappy state of affairs.
