

How Curtin Expects to be Re-Elected.

(From the Evening Journal.) A Harrisburg correspondent of the Age furnishes the following, which we doubt not, is true:

Messrs Editors: There is no question of the fact that the Abolitionists intend bringing into this State, about election time, a body of soldiers to assist them in electing Curtin, either by voting directly for him, or by keeping timed voters away from the polls with the show of military strength and threats of violence. Governor Curtin knows that unless some such desperate means are resorted to, his case is hopeless, and he is determined not to be outvoted, if the army can save him. Sundry mysterious movements of the Governor and his confidential friends, taken in connection with such hints from that portion of the Abolition press which cannot conceal their exultation at the prospect of carrying the election through the intervention of the army, point to the most atrocious conspiracy ever devised by political desperadoes to destroy the ballot-box and crush the liberties of the people. Fortunately, the garrulous Governor has so many confidants that the plot is no longer a secret. It leaks out at every point. Exciting, shoulder-strapped gentry, in their yellow moments, blab the great secret in bar rooms and upon street corners. Even conversations occurring in the Executive Chamber sometimes reach the public ear, and the following substance of an interview between the Governor and the Major of a Pennsylvania regiment who was wounded at the first assault upon Fort Wagner, comes to me from so reliable a source that I cannot refrain from imparting it to your readers:

Major—Governor, cannot I have my furlough extended? I wish to beat home on election day to vote for you. Governor—Certainly. That will be easily managed. Go to Dr. King, the Surgeon-General, and he will give you a certificate that will enable you to have your furlough extended.

Major—(with a sly wink)—Governor, a great many of the boys would like to come home to vote for you.

Governor—Never fear; we will have enough of them at home on election day.

The writer represented that Curtin is endeavoring to make capital for himself by asserting that Judge Woodward, on the bench, was the cause of disfranchising the soldiers, thus making Judge Woodward responsible for an acknowledged plain provision of the Constitution. Doubtless, Judge Woodward is quite willing to stand or fall, by the provision of the Constitution on which the decision of the Court was based, yet whatever of unpopularity attaches to that provision should be saddled upon him. He, as a Judge, is sworn to support that Constitution and interpret the laws according to its provisions, and his part in the decision relative to the soldiers' vote, was but an act of public duty in his obedience to his oath of office. The attempt of Curtin to make capital for himself by representing Judge Woodward as being personally responsible for the disfranchisement of the soldiers, is eminently worthy of its author and of the party he represents. It is mean and cowardly in the extreme.

But, our chief object in referring to the letter in the Age, is to draw the attention of the people to Curtin's plan of carrying his own election by means of furloughed and imported soldiers of his own peculiar faith. We have no doubt that he and his party intend to have as many of their friends in the army as can be spared furloughed and sent home to vote in Connecticut and New Hampshire. It is intended to scatter these throughout the State, wherever their former residence was, and to have as many fraudulent votes polled by the soldiers from other States, but now in various parts of Pennsylvania, and especially in this city, as can be smuggled into the ballot-box. Curtin and his co-workers know full well that a fair vote of the people would overwhelm him with defeat. No intelligent man can mistake the signs pointing to this result, if a fair vote be had, and hence the Abolition design of succeeding by means of furloughed soldiers favorable to Curtin who is so much lauded as the "soldier's friend." That no Democratic soldiers will be allowed to vote may be regarded as certain. If, by chance, any should gain permission to return, and vote for Judge Woodward, they will, if officers, be removed, as was Lieutenant Edgery, of New Hampshire.

Soldiers enlisted from this State, who may be sent home to vote, cannot be prevented from voting; but let the Democrats have an eye to the actions of the enemy respecting Republican soldiers from New England and other States now in Pennsylvania, and see to it that the friends of Mr. Curtin shall not succeed in perpetrating the fraud of voting imported men. Let us have a fair and legal election, at all hazards.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

PURSUANT to an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "AN ACT relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth," Approved the 2nd day of July, A. D. 1839. I JOHN BUCK, High Sheriff of the County of Cambria, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the Electors of the County aforesaid that a GENERAL ELECTION will be held in the County of Cambria on the SECOND TUESDAY, being the 13th day of OCTOBER, A. D. 1863, at which the State and County officers will be elected, to wit:

- One person to fill the office of Governor of the State of Pennsylvania. One person to fill the office of Supreme Judge of the State of Pennsylvania. One person to fill the office of member of the House of Representatives of the State of Pennsylvania. One person to fill the office of Register and Recorder. One person to fill the office of Treasurer. One person to fill the office of Coroner. One person to fill the office of County Commissioner.

One person to fill the office of Director of the Poor and House of Employment of said county. One person to fill the office of Auditor for said county.

The electors of the township of Allegheny to meet as follows, to wit:—The electors of the district composed of that part of said township of Allegheny, beginning at a line dividing Blair and Cambria counties, at a point on the dividing line of two tracts of land, one of which is warranted in the name of Aaron Bowen, and the other in the names of Mary Bowen and Van Lewis, thence south 29 degrees west to a point on the old Burzoon Gap Road thence along said road to the township road leading to Burnt Mills, thence south 13 degrees west 26 1/2 perches to Dawson's Mills and house, thence along the township road to Burnt Mills, to dividing line between Allegheny and Washington townships, thence along Washington township line to dividing line between Cambria and Blair counties to meet at the School House, in the town of Gallitzin in said district; and the electors of that part of said township of Allegheny, residing outside of the above described boundaries, to meet at School House No. 9 in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Blacklick, to meet at the house of Adam Meakin, in the village of Belsano, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Cambria, to meet at the Court House in the Borough of Ebsenburg.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Carroll, to meet at the School House in Carrolltown, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Carrolltown, to meet in the School House in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Chest Springs, to meet at the house of Jacob Wagner, in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Clearfield, to meet at School House No. 3, adjoining the village of Saint Augustin, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Conemaugh, to meet at the School House at Singers, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Conemaugh to meet as follows, first Ward to meet at the house now occupied by Peter Malzie, in the first Ward of said Borough, Second Ward to meet at the house now occupied by John Headrick, in said second Ward.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Croyle, to meet in the School House in the village of Summerhill in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Ebsenburg to meet as follows: East Ward at the Court House in said Ward, West Ward at James Myers' Hall in said Ward.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Jackson to meet at the house of Henry Rager, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Johnstown, to meet as follows: 1st Ward at the Public School House, No. 5, in said Ward; 2d Ward at the Johnstown House, corner of Main and Locust street, in said Ward; 3d Ward at the Foster House, in said Ward; 4th Ward at the Mansion, in said Ward; 5th Ward at the Kernville Hotel, in said Ward.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Loretto, to meet in the School House of said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Munster, to meet at the warehouse of Augustin Durbin, in the village of Munster, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Millville, to meet at the house of Jacob Kring, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Millville to meet at the Franklin House, in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Summerhill, to meet at the School House in the Borough of Wilmore, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Yoder, to meet at the Public House occupied by Peter Fink.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Cambria City, to meet at School House No. 2, in said Borough.

And I further give notice, as in and by the 13th Section of the aforesaid Act I am directed to do, That all persons, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States, or of this State, or any City or incorporated District, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judiciary or executive department of this State or the United States, or any City or incorporated District; also, that every member of Congress and the State Legislature, and of the Select and Common Councils or any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector or Judge, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for. Also, in the 4th section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to elections and for other purposes," Approved the 10th day of April, 1856, it is enacted that the foregoing 13th section shall not be so construed as to prevent any military officer or Borough officer from serving as Judge or Inspector at any general or special elections in the Commonwealth.

Also, that in the 61st section of said Act it is enacted that "every General and Special Election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment, until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.

The general, special, city, incorporated, district, and township elections and all elections for electors of President and Vice President of the United States, shall be held and conducted by the Inspectors and Judges elected as aforesaid, and by clerks appointed as hereinafter provided. No person shall be permitted to vote at any election, as aforesaid, but a white freeman of the age of twenty-one years or more, who shall have resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote at least ten days immediately preceding such election, and within two years paid a State or County tax which shall have been assessed at least ten days before the election. But a citizen of the United States who had previously been a qualified voter of this State, and removed therefrom and returned, and who shall have resided in the election district, and paid taxes as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote after residing in this State six months.—Provided, That the white freemen, citizens of the United States, between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-two years, and have resided in the election district ten days as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote, although they shall not have paid their taxes.

No person shall be permitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants, furnished by the Commissioner, unless first he produce a receipt for the payment within two years of a State or County tax, assessed agreeably to the Constitution and give satisfactory evidence, either on his own oath or affirmation, or that of another, that he has paid such tax, or on failure to produce a receipt, shall make oath thereon, second, if he claim a right to vote by being an elector between the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years, he shall depose on oath or affirmation that he has resided in the State at least one year before his application, and make such proof of his residence in the district as is required by this Act and that he does verily believe, from the accounts given him, that he is of age aforesaid, and give such other evidence as is required by this act, whereupon the name of the person so admitted to vote, shall be inserted in the Alphabetical list by the Inspector, and a note made opposite thereto by writing the word "Tax" if he shall be permitted to vote by reason of having paid tax; or the word "Age" if he shall be admitted to vote by reason of such age shall be called out to the Clerks, who shall make their notes in the list of voters kept by them. In all such cases where the name of a person claiming to vote as found on the list furnished by the Commissioners and Assessors, or his right to vote, whether found thereon or not is objected to by any qualified citizens, it shall be the duty of the Inspectors to examine such person on oath as to his qualifications, and if he claims to have resided within the State for one year or more, his oath shall not be sufficient proof thereof, but shall make proof thereof by at least one competent witness, who shall be a qualified elector, that he has resided within the district for more than ten days next preceding said election, and shall also himself swear that his bona fide residence, in pursuance of his lawful calling, is within the district, and that he did not remove into said district for the purpose of voting therein. "Every person qualified, as aforesaid, and who shall make due proof, as is required, of his residence, and payment of taxes as aforesaid, shall be admitted to vote in the township, ward, or district, in which he shall reside. "If any person shall prevent or attempt to prevent, any officer of any election, under this act from holding such election, or use or threaten any violence to any such officer, or shall interrupt or improperly interfere with that execution of his duty, or shall block up the window, or avenue to any window, where the same may be holding, or shall riotously disturb the peace of such election, or shall use or practice any intimidating threats, force or violence, with design to influence unduly, or overawe, any elector, or to prevent him from voting, or to restrain the freedom of choice, such persons on conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$500, be imprisoned for any time not less than one month, nor more than twelve months; and if it shall be shown to the Court where the trial of such offence shall be had, that the person so offending was not a resident of the city, ward, district, or township where the said offence was committed and not entitled to vote therein, then, on conviction, he shall be sentenced to pay a fine not less than one hundred, nor

more than one thousand dollars, and imprisoned not less than six months nor more than two years."

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the Act first aforesaid, the Judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate or return of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of one Judge from each district, at the Court House, in the Borough of Ebsenburg, on the Third day after the day of election, being Friday the 16th day of October, A. D. 1863, then and there to do and perform those duties required of them by law.

And further, if any Judge, by sickness or unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges, then the certificate or return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or clerks of the election of the same district, who shall do and perform the duties of said Judge unable to attend.
