

Proclamation by Governor Curtin--A Call for 12,000 Men for 100 Days.

HARRISBURG, July 5, 1864. Pennsylvania, ss: A. G. CURTIN: In the name and by the authority of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Andrew G. Curtin, Governor of said Commonwealth.

WHEREAS, The President of the United States has this day made a call upon the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for twelve thousand (12,000) militia as volunteer infantry, to serve at Washington and its vicinity for one hundred days, unless sooner discharged.

I, Andrew G. Curtin, Governor of the said Commonwealth, do make this, my proclamation, in response thereto, and do hereby call on the freemen of the Pennsylvania militia to come promptly forward, as they have heretofore done, and fill the requisition for the important service.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the State at Harrisburg this 5th day of July, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and of the Commonwealth the eighty-ninth.

Sacrifices of the Polish Ladies.

Patriotic ladies of Poland finding that renewed sacrifices were necessary in the war with Russia have sent their jewels to England for sale, the proceeds to be devoted to the relief of those poor sick and wounded Poles who now, almost bereft of hope, are slowly languishing in secrecy and suffering.

Among the jewelry sold was a large collection of wedding rings and love tokens belonging to Polish women who had lost their husbands during the insurrection, and who did not hesitate to sacrifice these relics in the hope that the amount obtained for them would lessen the suffering of those who had struggled and bled in the cause for which their husbands had fallen.

Many of these rings bore the joint initials of husband and wife, and some of them were also engraved with appropriate mottoes and quotations. There were also four bead necklaces sent by the nuns who, having nothing else to offer, had given up the only ornaments they were permitted to use.

In one of the galleries were two beautiful shawls valued at fifty guineas each, and in the room known as the Fox Room, adjoining the small chamber in which the great English statesman died, were two fine oil paintings, the property of Polish families, which were offered at the price of \$5,000 each.

Among the miscellaneous articles for sale were three silver snuff boxes, which had been sent by Russians with a view of benefitting their oppressed fellow subjects. Some of the rings bore dates which showed they had been worn in some cases fifty, in others but two or three years. The sales were at exceedingly low prices, the love tokens and rings going often for only a few shillings.
