The State Militia Bill.

The following are the features of the Militia Bill passed by the Legislature and now in the hands of the Governor:

Sec. 1. The Governor and State Treasurer are authorized to borrow three million dollars on the faith of the Commonwealth; to issue certificates of loan or coupon bonds, of not less than one hundred dollars, bearing six per cent. per annum interest, payable semi-annually in Philadelphia not to be taxable for any purpose, and to be reimbursable any time after ten years.

Sec. 2. Bonds to be signed by the Governor, countersigned by the State Treasurer and Auditor General. The Governor is authorized to draw warrants on the Treasurer for expenses of negotiating loan, to be paid out of the treasury.

Sec. 3. Authorizes the Governor to appoint one major general and two brigadier generals, of military education, skill, and experience, to have command of all the militia forces of Pennsylvania.

Sec. 4. Relates to the quartermasters' and commissary departments, the inspection of stores, letting of contracts, &c.

Sec. 5. Authorizes the Governor to organize a military corps, to be called the Pennsylvania State Guard, to be composed in the proportion of cavalry, infantry and artillery. The regiments to be composed of companies of like number, and to be armed, equipped, clothed, disciplined, governed and paid similar to Federal troops, and to be enlisted in the service of the State for a period not exceeding three years, unless sooner discharged, to be called into service at such times as the Governor may deem necessary. The Governor to appoint all regimental officers, and companies to elect company officers. All officers to be citizens of the Commonwealth.

Sec. 6. Authorizes the Governor to provide hospital arrangements, camps of instruction, arms and accoutrements, garrison and camp equipment, transportation, subsistence and all things necessary for putting the Guard into service; to take and use horses for cavalry and artillery service, for which compensation shall be made within six months; and to seize railroads and such other means of transportation as the exigencies of the case demand.

Sec. 7. Authorizes the Governor to cause an immediate enrollment to be made, and to draw the State Guard from the militia, by draft or volunteering, from such portions of the Commonwealth as he may deem necessary. Persons fit for service may be received as volunteers without return to age.

Sec. 8. Authorizes the Governor to use the enrollment of the General Government if necessary. It prohibits, however, he is required to make an enrollment. Assessors who refuse to enroll within five days after notification by the Governor to be removed and others appointed to make the enrollment. The Governor to appoint one competent person in each district, a physician, who in conjunction with county or city commissioners, shall constitute a board of enrollment to determine exemptions, three of whom—the physician being one—to constitute a quorum. All other duties of the enrollment shall be conducted under the act of May 4, 1864, to which this act is a supplement. The physician to receive five and the commissioners to receive three dollars per day. The Governor to have power to make and enforce all orders necessary to give efficiency to the act.

Sec. 9. The Quartermaster General is authorized to sell any unserviceable ordnance, the proceeds to be applied to the purchase of new.

Sec. 10. Where the brigade funds of counties is not sufficient to pay the assessors, under the 3d section of the original act, they shall be paid by the several cities and counties in which the assessment is made.
