No News from Sherman.

We have again to report, says the Richmond Examiner, that another day has passed without the receipt of definite advices from Southern Georgia. We have no doubt that Sherman has now arrived before Savannah, and now holds the same position, in some respects there that Hood occupies at Nashville. It would be very difficult to learn the result of any battle near Savannah, by way of Augusta, as the news would necessarily come from the | rear of the enemy, and if forwarded to Augusta, would occupy some time in its transmission to that city by couriers. The most direct and speedy news from Savanuah would reach as by telegraph via Charleston; but we apprehend that the wires have been cut between those cities, as there has been no direct communication from Savannah for several days. Thirty days have elapsed since Sherman started upon his expedition, and he must now be near the end of his journey. If we fail to hear of him before the next change of the moon, through confederate sources, the Yankee papers will be sure to contain something from him by the way of the coast, of the rensational and exaggerated style. We hope, therefore, that whatever news from Savannah reaches the war department during the next day or two will be given to the public. whatever he may do will have little effect on the fortune of the warr. His campaign may yet furnish additional material for Yankee brag, but has attained no strategical object, beyond the ruin of a halt of country a couple of mi'es wide, between Atlanta and the sea, and his presence on the sea-const is far less injurious and dang-rous than either at Chattanooza or Adanta.
