

Interesting Questions and Answers relative to the 7-30 U. S. Loan.

NEWS ITEMS.

The "Loyal" papers are felicitating themselves that Congress wound up without an extended drunk.

The Emperor of Russia has ordered a medal to be struck off to commemorate the suppression of the Polish rebellion of 1864.

The Pope is about to send the Empress Charlotte, of Mexico, a pure white rose composed of pearls and diamonds.

Mrs. Isabella Richie, relict of the well known editor Thomas Richie, died in Richmond on the 10th ult. She had reached the age of seventy-six years.

A Committee of the Massachusetts Legislature is considering the subject of emigration of women from that State to the West.

The new rebel privateer is reported at Coruna, Spain, where she is awaiting repairs. The gibeous Sacramento has left Cadiz to look after her.

The Senate has fixed the tax on tobacco twisted by hand at five cents; on smoking tobacco made with all the scraps included, thirty cents; and of the leaf forty cents.

Bigam Young, in a recent sermon, said: "The North prays that their swords may strike into the heart of every rebel, and I say, amen! and the south prays that the North may be cut down on a thousand battle-fields, and again I say, amen!"

A Paris letter says:—General McClellan intends to prolong his sojourn in Paris for some weeks, and thence go to Rome and Dresden, with the intention of spending next summer in the south of France, and returning to America next autumn.

The will of the late James W. Wallack has been admitted to probate in the Surrogate's Court in New York. It divides his estate between his sons, John Lester Wallack, the actor, and Captain Henry Wallack, of the British army, the theater being included in the portion of the former.

Arrangements are making at the Imperial Library at Paris for placing at the disposal of the public on Sunday a room containing a selection of forty thousand volumes, for the special benefit of those persons who cannot attend on week days.

John Stuart Mill, who has all along been a good friend of the United States, has directed that whatever copyright may be allowed by the American publishers of his works shall be given to the sanitary commission or some similar object of national charity.

The "Loyalists" of London, Va., have petitioned Congress to reimburse them for live stock captured by Sheridan. The claim is for sixty thousand dollars. It is alleged that "Phil." sold the entire lot in York, Pa., for thirty thousand dollars.

Lovelaceville, Polk county, Kentucky, was entered on the 1st of March by McDougall's band of guerrillas and robbed of \$10,000 worth of goods. The night before Hopkinsville was visited by the same band, several stores were robbed and two men killed.

The annual election in New Hampshire takes place on Tuesday, the 14th of March, when a Governor, three members of Congress, Council, Senate and House of Representatives are to be chosen. The Democrats have but one member of Congress, Marcy, from the 1st district, who is a candidate for re-election, opposed by Gen. Marston. At the last election Marcy's majority was eighty.

There is a prospect of trouble in Utah. The Colorado News states that, recently, General Conner established a provost guard in Salt Lake City for the purpose of preventing disorder. Brigham Young demanded that they should be removed, and made preparations to attack them, and was only deterred from doing so by General Conner's turning his guns on Brigham's harem and throwing shells over the city to the country beyond, and telling him if he wanted the provost guard removed he must remove them. The guard remained, but the discontented rebel also, and the News thinks it probable it will soon break out in acts of violence.
