The Return of Civil State.

Judge Cardozo, of New York, recently granted a writ of habeas corpus, directed to Superintendent Kennedy, which the latter treated with contempt, as has been the practice of that class of officials for the past three years. Kennedy failed to pay any regard to the writ issued by the Judge. The latter promptly put the matter into the hands of the sheriff, who was authorized to use the whole power of the county to bring the delinquent superintendent to court. Kennedy was finally compelled to obey the mandate of the Court, and apologize for the course he had seen fit to pursue.

This is a welcome indication of a return to civil rule. The lives and liberties of men are no longer to be at the mercy of officials like Kennedy, who acted as the instruments of partisan hate or private malice, rather than as the agents of the law. With the termination of the war the occupation of this class of men has ceased, and they themselves are made fully to feel what so often they have unjustly inflicted. The civil law is now paramount in New York, and we hope that similar attempts will be made to put it under the shadow of military rule in every part of the country.

Jeff Davis commanded Johnston not to surrender, but to disband his infantry, spike his cannon, and with his cavalry and mounted artillery to cover the flight of the remnant of the Confederate Government, but Johnston refused to obey the order.

Thirty-three young men and boys were arrested and fined two dollars and costs for loitering about church doors in New York City, on Sunday last.
