THE MARKETS.

Ennisburg, April 5th, 1866.—Corn is selling at \$1.00 per bushel; Butter, 35 cents per pound; Eggs, 20c per dozen; Beans, \$1.25 and \$1.50 per bushel; Oats, \$1.50; Flaxseed, \$2.50; Timperley, \$3.50; Cloverseed, \$8.50; Codie, 35 and 37½ per pound; Molasses, 16 per gallon; Syrup, \$1.25 and \$1.60; Brown Sugar, 15 to 20c per pound; White, 22 to 25c; Rice, 15c; Wool, 50c; Flour \$10.50 to \$11.50 per barrel:

The following report of the Philadelphia Markets, is copied from the *Saturday Evening Post*, dated April 7, 1866:

FOOD AND MEAL.—The market presents no new feature: sales of 6000 bbls, in lots, at \$8.25 for common Lancaster County family, up to \$9.25 for good North-western, including some Pennsylvania and Ohio at \$9.25 and \$10; superfluous at \$6.25 and \$7 and fineay at \$11 to \$15 per bbl. Rye Flour sells at \$4.75.

GRAIN.—The market is very poorly supplied with good Wheat. Sales of 700 bushels at \$2 and \$2.40 for common to choice. Small sales of Pennsylvania Rye at \$5 and 20c. Corn—Sales of 5000 bushels in store, and 71c afloat. Oats—150 bushels of Pennsylvania sold at 49½c. Provisions.—The sales are in a retail way only at former rates; small lots of New York Pork are reported at \$26.50 and \$27 per bbl. Bacon Hams at 20 and 25c. Pickled at 18c, and Lard in 16c and 18c at 19c per lb. Butter—Sales at 50 and 60c per lb. Eggs—sell at 25 and 25c per dozen.

DRUGS.—Sales new Eastern and Western 60 and 80c.

SEEDS.—There is a fair inquiry for good and prime Clovers, with sales 2000 bushels at 85 and 86c. Timothy, 300 bushels at \$3.50. Flaxseed sells at \$2.75 and \$2.50 per bushel.

LIVESTOCK.—The supply of Beef Cattle during the past week amounted to about 1200 head. The prices realized from 150 and 160c per lb. 200 Cows bought from \$40 to \$75 per head. Sheep—6000 head were disposed of at from 7 and 8 cents per lb. 1000 Hogs at from \$13.00 and 15.00 per 100 lbs.

A man named Christian Malone, in employ of Cooper Co., coal operators of Hollidaysburg, was killed, on Friday morning of last week, in thesylvania Rail Road Tunnel, at Galien, by being run over by a freight train. Malone jumped on the rear of the train for the purpose of riding through, and the remonstrance of several persons. He was thrown off in the Tunnel; one of his legs was cut off and he was otherwise so seriously injured as to cause his death in a few hours after the accident. The unfortunate man was a resident of Hollidaysburg, and leaves a wife and five children.

In the case of Cambria county against Henry A. Boggs, it was decided this day at the Argument Court by Judge Boggs, that Bank Stock is only taxable dividends, for State purposes, and not to be taxed for County and other taxes like other property.
