PENNSYLVANIA WANTED.—The Cleveland Herald gives the following, which, we trust will reach the eye of some friend of the departed soldier referred to:

Geo. Wilson, supposed to be a resident of Pennsylvania, was enlisted by Capt. Wm. Kenny, of Co. B, 8th Ohio Infantry, in June, 1861. Just before the battle of Gettysburg he gave the Captain a cheque for \$60. During that memorable engagement Wilson was killed. The Captain, now living in this city, has the cheque and says there is some back pay and bounty due the soldier.
