

The Negroes and the Foreigners.

Last week Mr. Thaddeus Stevens, the leader of the Radicals in Pennsylvania, made a speech in favor of Geary and negro equality, at Bedford, to which we briefly alluded yesterday. In the Press of Monday, we find a complete report of his remarks upon that occasion, and the following extracts will show the sincerity of the great "Back-slit" hero. In the first place, let us notice the rap he gave his own handling—Congress—which body he and Sumner ruled with a rod of iron. In doing so, he made this startling confession:

"Adult Congress became demagogical in the last few days, when all mankind was excited out of everybody. They did some things to excite the Fenians into our ranks."

Here we have a candid acknowledgment that the Radicals are demagogues, and the still franker admission that their action on the Neutrality Laws was only a dodge to excite the Fenians and catch Irish votes.

The course then proceeded to endorse the doctrine of negro equality and negro suffrage, in this wise:

"The most effective argument (if argument it can be called) which will be used by our opponents, is the effort made by the Republicans to give equal rights to every human being, even to the African. We shall hear repeated, ten thousand times, the cry, "Negro Equality." The Radicals would thrust the negro into your parlor, your bed-room, and the bosoms of your wives and daughters. They would even make your reluctant daughters marry black men. And then they will send up the grand obsequies from every fourth door, "nigger!" "nigger!" "nigger!" "Down with the nigger party, we are for the white man's party." These unanswerable arguments will ring in every low bar-room, and be printed in every blackguard sheet throughout a land whose fundamental maxim is, *non proterbo* and equal. The chief opponents of this slang consist of two or three different classes. The unprincipled, brazen demagogue, possessed of some cunning, but no conscience. Among those who have an unequal mixture of regard and spite, are the low, ignorant, illiterate natives, as well as foreigners, who dwell about the purlieus of our towns and cities, and live by pilfering and "cut jobs."

The Protestant will listen to a devout sermon from the text, "Of one blood made we all the nations of the earth," and go forth to the next political meeting to shout "down with the negro!" The Catholic will listen attentively to the reading from the altar of the Pope's Bull denouncing slavery, and go forth to support the slavery party, and shout "Down with the negro!"

As I said before, the great issue to be set at this election is the question of negro rights. I shall not deny, but admit, that a fundamental principle of the Republican creed is that every being possessing an immortal soul is equal before the law. They are not and cannot be equal in strength, height, beauty, intellectual and moral culture, or social requirements; these are accidents which must govern their condition according to circumstances. But in this Republic the same laws must and shall apply to every mortal, American, Irishman, African, German or Turk. It is written by the finger of the Almighty law-giver, "Ye shall have one manner of laws, as well for the stranger as for one of your own country; for I am the Lord your God."

There can be no mistaking these utterances. Mr. Stevens "speaks by the ear," and puts the issue fairly and squarely before the people. "The great issue," said he, "in this election is the question of negro rights." The Republicans, he distinctly announced, intend "to give equal rights to every human being, even to the African." And, in the intensity of his passion, he could not resist the temptation to slander and abuse the foreigner and Catholic who will not fall down and worship the black idol. To that class of the community he is unsparring in his denunciations. The choice epithets he applies to them are, "rogues and dupes," "low, ignorant, illiterate foreigners, who dwell about the purlieus of our towns and cities, and live by pilfering." Yet he acknowledged, in the same breath, that the "demagogical" Congress attempted to "seduce" these same voters into the Radical ranks. This is Radicalism unmasked—the Radicalism which is laboring to put Geary into the gubernatorial chair of Pennsylvania—the Radicalism which will meet with a sure and overwhelming defeat at the ballot-box on the second Tuesday of October—Age.
