Election Proclamation.

PURSUANT to an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "AN ACT relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth." Approved 2nd day of July, A. D., 1859. I, JAMES MYERS, High Sheriff of the County of Cambria, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the Electors of the County of Cambria, that a General Election will be held in the County of Cambria on the SECOND TUESDAY, being the 9th day of OCTOBER, A. D., 1866, at which the State and County Officers will be elected, to wit: One person to fill the office of Governor of the State of Pennsylvania. One person to represent the counties of Blair, Cambria, Huntingdon and Mifflin in the Congress of the United States. One person to represent the County of Cambria in the Legislature of Pennsylvania. One person to fill the office of Register of Wills, Recorder of Deeds and Clerk of the Orphans Court. Two persons to fill the office of Associate Judges of Cambria county. One person to fill the office of Commissioner of Cambria county. One person to fill the office of Poor House Director of Cambria county. One person to fill the office of Coroner of Cambria county. One person to fill the office of Auditor of Cambria county. The electors of the district composed of the township of Allegheny, to meet at the office of M. Leavy, Esq., in the borough of Loretto.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Carrolltown, to meet at the School House in Carrolltown in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Carrolltown, to meet in the School House in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Chest, to meet at the School House on the farm of Richard J. Proudfoot, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Chest Springs, to meet at the house of Jacob Wagner in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Clearfield, to meet at School House No. 3, adjoining the village of St. Augustine, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Conemaugh, to meet at the School House at Singer's in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Johnstown, to meet as follows: 1st Ward at the Public School House, No. 5, in said Ward; 2d Ward at the Johnstown House, corner of Main and Locust street, in said Ward; 3d Ward at the Foster House, in said Ward; 4th Ward at the Mansion, in said Ward; 5th Ward at the Kernville Hotel, in said Ward.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Loretto, to meet in the School House of said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Munster, to meet at the warehouse of Augustine Durbin, in the village of Munster, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Prospect, to meet at the school house in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Richland, to meet at the house of Jacob King, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Millville, to meet at the Franklin House, in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Summerhill, to meet at the School House in the Borough of Wilmore, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Sunnyside, to meet at the School House in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Susquehanna, to meet at the house of Jerome Platt, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Taylor, to meet at the School House, near John Hendrick's, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Washington, to meet at the School House situated at the foot of Plane No. 4, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Wilmore, to meet at the School House, in said Borough.

The electors of the district composed of the township of White, to meet at the School House No. 1, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Yeager, to meet at the Public House occupied by Peter Fink.

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Cambria City, to meet at School House No. 2, in said Borough. And I further give notice, as in and by 13th Section of the aforesaid Act, I am directed, that all persons, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office of appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States, or of this State, or any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, judiciary or executive department of this State or the United States, or any city or incorporated district; also that every member of Congress and the State Legislature, and of the select and common councils or any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector, Judge, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for. Also, in the 4th section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to elections and for other purposes," Approved the 10th day of April 1856, it is enacted that the foregoing 13th section shall not be construed so as to prevent any military officer or Borough officer from serving as Judge or Inspector at any general or special elections in the Commonwealth.

Also, that in the 6th section of said Act it is enacted that "every General and Special Election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock in the forenoon or afternoon, until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed. The general, special, city, incorporated, district and township elections and all elections for electors of President and Vice Presidents for the United States, shall be held and conducted by the inspectors and Judges elected as aforesaid, and by clerks appointed as hereinafter provided. No person shall be permitted to vote at any election, as aforesaid, but a white free-man of the age of twenty-one years or more, who shall have resided in this State at least

one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote at least ten days immediately preceding such election, and within two years paid a State or County tax which shall have been assessed at least ten days before the election. But a citizen of the United States who had previously been a qualified voter of this State, and removed therefrom and returned, and who shall have resided in the election district, and paid taxes as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote after residing in this State six months. Provided, That the white freemen, citizens of the United States, between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-two years and have resided in the election district ten days as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote although they shall not have paid their taxes.

No person shall be permitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants, furnished by the assessor, unless first he produce a receipt for the payment within two years of a State or County tax assessed agreeably to the Constitution and give satisfactory evidence either on his own oath or affirmation, or that of another, that he has paid such tax, or on failure to produce a receipt, shall make oath thereof, or second if he claim a right to vote by being an elector between the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years, he shall depose on oath or affirmation that he has resided in the State at least one year before his application, and make such proof of his residence in the district as is required by this Act and that he does verily believe, from the accounts given him, that he is of age aforesaid, and give such other evidence as is required by this Act, when upon the name of the person so admitted to vote, shall be entered in the Alphabetical list by the Inspector, and a note made opposite thereto by writing the word "Tax" if he shall be permitted to vote by reason of having paid tax; or by the word "Age" if he shall be admitted to vote by reason of such age shall be called out to the Clerks, who shall make their notes in the list of voters kept by them.

In all such cases where the name of a person claiming to vote is found on the list furnished by the Commissioners and Assessors, or his right to vote, whether found thereon or not, is objected to by any qualified citizen, it shall be the duty of the Inspectors to examine such person on oath as to his qualifications, and if he claims to have resided within the State for one year or more, his oath shall not be sufficient proof thereof, but shall make proof thereof by at least one competent witness, who shall be a qualified elector, that he has resided within the district for more than ten days next preceding said election, and shall also himself swear that his bona fide residence, in pursuance of his lawful calling, is within the district, and that he did not remove into said district for the purpose of voting therein.

Every person qualified as aforesaid, and who shall make due proof, as is required of aforesaid, and payment of taxes as aforesaid, shall be admitted to vote in the township, ward or district, in which he shall reside. If any person shall prevent or attempt to prevent, any officer of any election, under this act from holding such election or use or threaten any violence to any such officer, or shall interrupt or improperly interfere within the execution of his duty, or shall block up the window, or avenue to any window, where the same may be holding, or shall riotously disturb the peace of such election, or shall use or practice any intimidating threats, force or violence, with design to influence unduly, or overawe, any elector, or to prevent him from voting, or to restrain the freedom of choice, such persons on conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$500, be imprisoned for any time not less than one month, nor more than twelve months; and if it shall be shown to the Court where the trial of such offence shall be had, that the person so offending was not a resident of the city, ward, district, or township where the said offence was committed and not entitled to vote therein, then on conviction, he shall be sentenced to pay a fine not less than one hundred or more than one thousand dollars, and imprisoned not less than six months nor more than two years.

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the Act first aforesaid, the Judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate or return of their respective districts and produce them at a meeting of one Judge from each district, at the Court House, in the Borough of Ebensburg, on the Third day after the day of election, being Friday the 13th day of October, A. D., 1866 then and there to do and perform those duties required of them by law. And further, if any Judge, by sickness or unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges then the certificate or return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or Clerks of the election of the same district, who shall do and perform the duties of said Judge unable to attend.

That the qualified voters of the several aforesaid districts, borough, and special elections, are hereby hereafter, authorized and required to vote, by tickets, printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, severally classified as follows: One ticket shall embrace the names of all judges of courts voted for, and to be labeled, outside, "judiciary;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all state officers voted for, and be labeled "state;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all county officers voted for including office of senator, member and members of assembly, if voted for, and members of congress, if voted for, and be labeled "county;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all township officers voted for and be labeled "township;" one ticket shall embrace the names of all borough officers voted for, and be labeled "borough;" and each class shall be deposited in separate ballot boxes.

Whereas, by an act of the Congress of the United States, entitled "An act to amend the several acts heretofore passed, to provide for the enrolling and calling out the national forces, and for other purposes," and approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, all persons who have deserted the military or naval service of the United States, and who have not been discharged, or relieved from the penalty or disability therein provided, are deemed and taken, to have voluntarily relinquished and forfeited their rights of citizenship and their rights to become citizens, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens thereof.

And whereas, Persons, not citizens of the United States, are not, under the Constitution and laws of Pennsylvania, qualified electors of this Commonwealth:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That in all elections hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, it shall be unlawful for the judge or inspectors of any such election to receive any ballot, or ballots from any person, or persons, embraced in the provisions, and subject to the disability, imposed by said act of Congress, approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote any ballot or ballots.

Section 2. That if any judge and inspectors of election, or any one of them shall receive or consent to receive any such unlawful ballot or ballots, from any such disqualified person, he or they, so offending, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, he shall for such offence, be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprisonment, in the jail of the proper county, for not less than sixty days.

Section 3. That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall at any election, hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, vote, or tender to the officers thereof, and offer to vote a ballot or ballots, any person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall for each offence, be punished in like manner as is provided in the preceding section of this act, in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot, or ballots.

Section 4. That if any person shall hereafter persuade, or advise, any person or persons, deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, to offer any ballot or ballots to the officers of any election hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, or shall persuade or advise any such officer to receive any ballot or ballots, from any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, such person so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall be punished in like manner as is provided in the second section of this act, in the case of officers of such election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.
