That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall at any election, hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, vote, or tender to the officers thereof, and offer to vote a ballot or ballots, any person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, shall for each offence, be punished in like manner as is provided in the preceding section of this ct, in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballet, or ballets.
