Foreign News by the Europa.

Halifax, Oct. 17. The royal mail steamship Europa, Capt. Shannon, from Liverpool September 30th, on one day... arrived at Halifax at seven o'clock.

The United States steam frigate San Jacinto, left Southampton on the afternoon of the 27th, with a full pilot on board, for the Baltic, hoping to be in time to witness the bombardment of Revel.

It is confirmed that on Sept. 18, Eupatoria was occupied, without opposition, by 2,000 Turkish, 1,000 French, and 1,000 English troops.

The Russian garrison, numbering 400, surrendered at discretion. The advanced guard was under command of Prince Napoleon.

On the 14th the main army landed unopposed, half way between Eupatoria and Sebastopol—horses, artillery and munitions—all safely.

Menshikov, who had his headquarters at Simferopol, immediately advanced to Burdink, on the river Alma, where he awaits reinforcements.

The Russian embassy at Vienna had received a dispatch dated the 22nd, from the Crimea, but all that had transpired was, that it contained news unfavorable to the Russians.

The latest date from the Crimea, (certain) is the 19th when the allies left from Cape Baba, and was intended to cross the Alma on the 10th, but Marshal S. Arnaud had telegraphed to Paris that there was an unavoidable delay of two days—cause not stated.

A Russian courier who had been captured, stated that the whole Russian force was only 45,000.

Russian accounts of the 19th say that General Canrobert had a fortified position at Eupatoria, and that the main body of the allies was on a small river north of a parallel with the river.

A large fire is now raging here, in the rear of the lines of the allies. Many buildings are on fire at the date of this dispatch.

A son of Jacob Berringer, the Postmaster at Cape Vincent, was arrested on Saturday night by Col. North, special Mail Agent, on a charge of being engaged in robbing the mail between Rome and Cape Vincent.

A gentleman who left New York, and who arrived here to-day, informs us that there was a report at Fall River this morning, that a vessel loaded with railroad iron had arrived at Warren, R. I., with 40 passengers picked up from one of the missing boats of the Arctic.

After carefully sifting all the testimony bearing upon the disaster of the Arctic, the Agents of the Company here entertain strong hopes, amounting almost to a certainty, that Mrs. Collins and a large number of other ladies were placed into one of the boats, and safely landed under the immediate supervision of Capt. Lee, and there appears to be strong reasons for the belief that the three missing boats may be yet heard of in many more passengers.

In the case of Jager, charged with the murder of Mordecai, the jury returned a verdict of manslaughter in the third degree, and he was sentenced to the State Prison for three years.

New Orleans papers have received up to Friday. Another man has died from the injuries he received in the late riot—being the 13th victim.

Burning of a Steamer and Loss of Life.

The steamer E. K. Collins, which left Detroit Sunday night, was a large number of passengers from the Maudslowi for Cleveland, and was completely enveloped in flames.

The fire began on the boiler deck, and so ran was the progress of the flames that the passengers and crew were unable to save any thing except the clothes they had on.

Among the missing are the following named persons:—Mr. Dibble, of New York; Samuel Powell, Lawrence Whalen, Thomas Cook, the Pittsburgh Railroad Agent, all of Cleveland; Mrs. M. Reilly, Mrs. Watson, infant child of Ashabuta, and fifteen of the crew.

The steamer was nearly new, having been built in Canada last year, and cost \$105,000. She was owned by Capt. B. Ward, and insured for \$18,000, as follows:—\$6,000 in the Mercantile and Mutual; \$8,000 in the Atlas office; and \$3,000 in the North American office of New York.
