Topics of the Week.

We notice that most of the opposition presses are jubilant over the result of the recent election in Connecticut. We always knew our political opponents were thankful for small favors, but we really had no idea that they would set up such an unbridled shout over a result which, if not a total rout, has demonstrated most conclusively that upon another trial defeat is inevitable.

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The bill, which had previously passed the House authorizing the election of another Judge in this district, was taken up on second reading on the 15th in the Senate. The free state Kansas tricksters, who got Gen. Cass to lay their memorial before the Senate, asking admission into the Union, have not made much by their operation—the document turning out to be a fraud.

The Plan of the Campaign.

All the movements of the so-called Republican party, or rather its assumed leaders (remarks the Rochester Advertiser), go to show a purpose to go to the people in the Presidential campaign, upon the simple question, as they phrase it, of the "Kansas iniquity."

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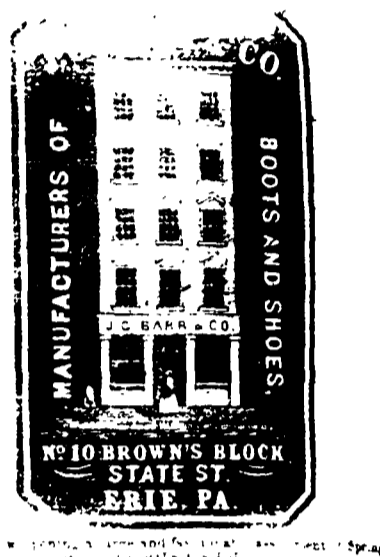
