The clause of the constitution establishing slave representation does simply this: It gives the slave States the credit for great talent; but the moment you send the Juright, in the apportionment for Representatives in Con- dictary out upon the hustings—the moment you make it gress, to have every five negroes counted as three white persons, a right which belongs to the political power of the State, and not to the individual slaveholder. We quote this clause of the constitution

"Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned the Union, according to their representative numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, threeafths of all other persons."

The N. Y. Journal of Commerce furnishes a very lucid

exposition of this clause, as follows The advantages which this provision confers belong equally to all legal voters in the State, and not to the owners of slaves exclusively. The voter who does not p sees a single slave derives as much additional political power from it as the planter who owns a thousand negroes. It is simply a right which the slaveholding States possess as political corporations, in which the poorest citizen entitled to a vote participates equally with the wealthiest planters. The assertion, therefore, that "a man who owns a thousand slaves has the same political power, by means of his slave property, as six hundred Inhabitants of the
