

Retailers & Tavern-keepers.

The act of the Legislature of Pennsylvania passed the 7th April 1830, entitled "An act graduating the duties upon wholesale dealers and retailers of foreign merchandize, and prescribing the mode of issuing licences and collecting said duties," among other things directs.

Section 8th. It shall be the duty of the proper city or county Treasurer, on the first day of June in each year, to make out a correct list of all those who have not paid the duty and obtained license, and it shall be the duty of such city or county Treasurer to institute a suit against such delinquents, under the directions of the second section of the act of March 1834, entitled "an act relating to inns, tavens, and retailers of vinous and spiritous liquors," directs
Section 15. The county treasurer re-

Section 15. The county treasurer receiving such licences shall deliver them to the persons to whom they may have been graned on their application and payment therefor, and make report to the court of the names of the persons who may have neglected to take out their licences at each successive term thereof.

Section 26. The said court shall upon receiving information of any such delinquent forthwith cause an indictment to be prefered against him before the grand jury for the cause aforesaid.


