COMMON SCHOOLS.

The following statement exhibits the number of taxable inhabitants, within the several common school districts of Huntingdon, and is made for the information of the directors in compliance with the 10th section of the school law of June 1836.

The amount which each accepting school district is entitled to receive the ensuing year, commencing on the 1st Tuesday of June next, out of the annual State appropriation, is a sum equal to ONE DOLLAR for each taxable inhabitant in the district.

The amount of school tax required to be levied to entitle a district to its share of the State appropriation, must be a sum equal to at least sixty cents for each taxable inhabitant in the district.

THE Volunteers and Militia composing the 2d B. of the 10th D. P. M. are hereby required to train by companies on Monday, the 4th day of May next, and by Battalion for inspection as follows.

151st Regiment, first battalion on Monday the 11th day of May. Second battalion on Tuesday the 12th.

149th Regiment, first battalion, on Wednesday, the 13th. Second battalion on Thursday the 14th.

62d Regiment, first battalion, on Friday the 15th. Second battalion on Monday the 18th; and the first volunteer battalion on the same day.

WHEREAS by an act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act directing the mode of selling Unseated Lands for taxes and for other purposes," passed the thirtieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, the Treasurers in the different parts of this Commonwealth are directed to commence on the second Monday in June, A.
