This however proves so great, that the Van Buren Speaker of the House has deemed it prudent not to call any more special elections, although two members have died since the adjournment. The only possible reason for such a course must be, the fact that the counties from which they were members, might give a like account of the downfall of Vanaliam.

They are a cunning set of politicians; but their cunning will not preserve them from the indignation of a deceived and injured people.
