WHEREAS by a precept to me directed dated at Huntingdon, the 14th day of November, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and forty, under the hands and seals of the Hon. Thomas Burnside, President of the Court of Common Pleas, Over and Terminus, and general jail deliverer of the 4th judicial district of Pennsylvania, composed of the counties of Mifflin, Huntingdon, Centre, Clearfield, and Jefferson, and the Hon.
