The Commissioners, for the information of all interested, make known, that they are bound by law not to "make any allowance or abatement in the valuation of any real estate in any other year than that in which the triennial assessment is made, excepting where buildings or other improvements have been destroyed subsequently to such triennial assessment; and in the case of personal property, offices, trades, professions and occupations, where there has been any alteration in the assessment, occasioning a different valuation from the former year; and also where persons have come to inhabit in the county since such triennial assessment"—and that according to law no notice in the two years succeeding the triennial assessment is to be given to the taxable inhabitants aforesaid, but in the latter case only.
