The amount of lax every district mustr levy to entitle itself to its share f the State appropriation, is a sum equal to at o least 60 cents for every taxable inhabitant in the district, according to the last frienmal enumeration made in the spring of 1839. A list of taxables in each district is hereto appended.
Districts that have already accepted the Common School system, and received their share of the appropriation for former years will, on levying the proper amount of tax, he entitled under the existing laws to receive for the Scholl year 1842, which commences on the first Monday of next June, one dollar for every taxable.
Destricts which have not received any part of the appropriation of former years, but which accept the system for the first time, at the annual elention in March next, and levy the proper amount of tax will under the existing laws receive \$4.50 for every taxable in 1835, and \$3.00 for every taxable in 1839, according to the above list.
