A pretty little sum. indeed ! and no noney? More than one thousand dollars month. Money enough, after taking his own pay out, to pay 40 daily laborers one dollar a day. Can any body imagine how this money has all been spent? Has any one seen 40 hands on thirty miles of the canal? It need not be said that it has been paid for Extraordinary Repairs; because, if you will ask those who have built bridges, locks, &c., and they like the laborers will say, NO MONEY

We wish every man who works on the canal to say whether he has not asked for money during the above 10 months, and has not been told no money !

But, this is not all. During the months of June and July, he drew \$5225 for old debts due before last November, making in all, nearly SEVENTEEN THOU-SAND DOLLARS in ten menths, and no money!

Joseph Riter has handled since June 8th. the snug sum of \$20,000, and we pre-
