## PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

"RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO THE AMENDMENT OF THE SAID CONSTITUTION"

"Resolved by the Senate an d ouse of Representative in General Assembly met, That the Constitution of this Commonwealth be amended in the third section of the second article, so that it shall read as follows: "

"That the Governor shall hold his office during three years, from the third Tuesday of January, next ensuing his election, and shall not be capable holding it longer than a single term three years, in any term of nine years."
