WAR IN EMBRYO.—By a private letter from Washington to a Navy Officer in this city, received on Friday, we learn that orders have been issued from the Navy Department to fit out the steam Frigates Mississippi at our Navy Yard, and the Missouri at New York, with all possible despatch; and also to prepare several of the vessels intended for the Home Squadron for sea service at once. The Mississippi, we are told, can be fitted out in a month ready to proceed to sea, with the exception of the large iron shaft which is being manufactured in the place of the one lost from a vessel in the East river at New York about two months since. The Missouri will require twice that length of time to complete her. These orders look like doing business in earnest.—Phila'd. Messenger.
