Rhode Island Affairs.

We have just been favored with the following letter, written in pencil, at the moment of the departure of the cars last evening, from Providence. Before this sheet, therefore, reaches our readers, blood may have flowed:—N. Y. American.

CADET ARMY, PROVIDENCE, May 17—6 1/2 o'clock, P. M.

Dear Sir—We are in open rebellion here; an outbreak is expected every moment. I am drafted in the Cadet Company; I shall leave for New York tomorrow, if I can. The suffrage military have just taken possession of the State cannon; they are now going to take the Arsenal. The crisis has come. We are all in arms. Yours, &c.

No time to write. I am at the cars—they are off in a moment. Just before writing this I was in the private council of Gov. King; there is a list of 1000 men who have pledged themselves to come out at a moment's notice—they are now issuing the orders.—The military are coming in from all parts of the State. The Dor troops are collecting, and in less than 48 hours the question will be settled.

The following extract is from the Providence Journal office: Tuesday, 2 P. M.

Mr. Dorr remains at the house of Barrington Anthony. The house is guarded by soldiers, and a cannon is placed by the side of it. At about 1 o'clock, the signal of alarm was given, and according to orders, some two or three hundred men assembled. A portion of them were armed. The alarm was given in consequence of a report that the Sheriff was about to arrest Dorr. The crowd was very much excited. Barrington Anthony addressed them, and declared that Dorr should never be taken from that house alive. A voice in the crowd demanded to be led on to the attack of the arsenal, and several responded to it; but the orator cautioned them against committing any "overt act." What an idea of government is this—that a government, which they say is legally established, cannot commit an overt act! Mr. Dorr ordered the military to meet them in the afternoon "prepared for action."

It is said that Mr. Dorr offered one of the marshals in his procession any place in the gift of the State, if he would lead the attack on the arsenal. He declined. Why does not Mr. Dorr lead the attack himself?

The New York Herald, second, edition of yesterday, says—When the train passed through Providence last evening, at half past six o'clock, the Suffrage party had all their plans laid for taking forcible possession of the State at 3 o'clock this morning.

It was reported by Mr. Anthony, the Suffrage Sheriff, in whose house Gov. Dorr remains for the present, that the Suffrage army then in Providence under arms numbered one thousand men, that they had already taken possession of the State Artillery, and that they had determined to make an attack on the Arsenal this morning.
