a sale may be effected, according to the provisions of this act, which costs shall be paid out of the proceeds of the sale, as in other cases.

Section 5. That before any person shall be entitled to a stay of execution on real estate levied upon, he shall pay the interest due on the debt, and the interest due upon prior liens thereon, and discharge all ground rents and municipal charges due on the property, subject to judgment and shall pay semi-annually during the continuation of the stay of execution, all the accruing interest on the judgment, and the accruing ground rent.
