On motion the House resolved itself into committee of the Whole, Mr. Deal, in the chair, on the bill; which was reported without amendment.

The attention of the House occupied with this subject until the hour of adjournment.

SENATE.

Tuesday, Feb. 21, 1843.

The Speaker laid before the Senate a communication from the Attorney General, in reply to the inquiry of the Senate, made nearly two months ago, and repeated on the 17th inst. in regard to the measures which he had adopted to recover for the use of the State, the delinquency of Frederick Frits, late Collector of Tolls on the Columbia Railroad, the same amounting to \$40,000 00.

A motion was made to refer the communication to the Judiciary committee.

A debate here sprung up which was participated in by Messrs. Darsie, Champey, Sullivan, and Penniman, all of whom handled the Attorney General very roughly.

Numerous petitions were presented and appropriately referred.

The Secretary of the Commonwealth, being introduced, presented a message from the Governor, announcing the veto of the Congressional Apportionment Bill.

Here an animated debate ensued, in which the "veto King" was held up in a very unenviable light by Messrs. Penniman, Darsie, Craig, Spackman, Champey, Farrelly, Stewart and Cochran.

The debate continued till the Senate adjourned.

Next week we will endeavor to make room for the Message and the debate.

Mr. Brawley, read in his place a bill to apportion the State into Congressional districts—and it was made the order of the day for Thursday next.

Mr. Deford offered a resolution that was modified, that when the House adjourn, they adjourn to meet to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock, and passed.

Mr. Elwell read in his place a bill to divide the State into Congressional districts, which was made the order of the day for Thursday next.

We received no papers from Harrisburg by Monday's mail; but we learn by letters, that very little of importance transpired in the Legislature on Wednesday and Thursday last.

The Senate held a short session on Wednesday, which was consumed in a personal debate between Messrs. Crabb and Spackman, of the city of Philadelphia, on the one side, and Mr. Sullivan, of Butler, on the other.
