Brutal Murder of Four Persons in New Jersey.

By an extra from the Trenton State Gazette, we learn that a most foul and unnatural murder of four persons was perpetrated in the county of Warren, in the State of New Jersey, on the night of Monday, (8th inst.) We give the particulars as we find them in the extra:

We learn by Mr. George Crockett, of Mark-borough, in Warren county who arrived in this city this (Wednesday) morning, that four persons were murdered on Monday night, at Chagewater, Warren county, about 10 miles from Belvidere, near the Huntington line. An old man, a bachelor, named John Parke, a man of wealth, lived with his brother-in-law, John Castner, who farmed Parke's place. On Tuesday morning Castner and his wife were found by the neighbors on the ground near a sink hole, with four cuts on his head, made by a sharp instrument, about an inch and a quarter broad. It appears as if he had been decaying from the house by some cry of distress raised by the murderer, who after killing him proceeded to the house, and entered by the doorway which had been open.

On going to the house, the neighbors discovered the dead body of Parke in bed, and in another room the dead bodies of Castner's wife and child, a little girl about two years old murdered in her mother's arms, and her mother's neck. It appeared to have been killed with the weapon which Castner was killed. They found a boy in another bed almost seriously wounded in the head, and unconscious of what had happened. He was unable to rise, and his life remains in great uncertainty. Of the whole household of seven persons, only two boys, sleeping in the back room, were left unharmed.

The respect of the murderer, or murderers, was undoubtedly to get money.—Parke's money, \$900 in specie, and \$1000 in bills, was in his trunk and chest, but the watches did not get up. Castner had \$200, and it is supposed \$300 in his desk, which was taken.

When our informant came to the place, there was a great concourse of people of the neighborhood at the house, and a committee was appointed to take charge of the murdered persons.

A coroner's inquest was held on Tuesday morning, and a verdict rendered in accordance with the above facts. The only person upon whom suspicion rests is a tall, stout man, in green spectacles, with black whiskers, a strange unknown to everyone, who had been seen in the neighborhood for three weeks, without any known business, and was last seen about two miles from the house, on the evening before the murder. Two persons started in pursuit of him, yesterday morning, and it is supposed they could overtake him, as the roads are very bad.

This murder of four persons in cold blood, the aged, the feeble, and the infant, without mercy, and without regard to the number of lives destroyed, or the sex of the victims, committed upon the old man in his study, and the people in fact as in his mother's bosom, which is terrible in any community, and among the quiet, peaceable, orderly agricultural community where it was committed, it is most appalling.

The Governor of New Jersey has offered three hundred dollars for the apprehension of the murderers. The friends of the deceased have offered one thousand dollars for the same object.

The following paragraph is the latest we have in regard to the above horrible affair:

Probably Arrest of the Murderers of Mr. Parke and his family.—I was informed by Mr. Coleman and Aunt L. natives of New Jersey, and residents in the neighborhood of the murdered family, have been arrested on suspicion of having perpetrated the crime. A wagon track was traced from Mr. Parke's house to the house of Coleman, on whose premises a wagon was found corresponding in width of tire, &c., with this track.

The authorities are still in pursuit of the person described as "an Englishman with green spectacles," who had been seen for a fortnight previous in the neighborhood.
