The New Orleans Picayune, alluding to the late Mexican news, says—No direct war can be declared by Mexico in the present condition of her affairs, the fool-hardiness of such a measure would be monstrous. And it is not unregsonable to say that the quasi war, which has so many advocates—a war for the re-conquest of Texas—is almost equally impracticable. There is some deep-seated, corroding disease preying upon the vitals of the government; a fixed distruct among the men of note deprives the administration of that union of ministerial ability and experience, which would acquire terial ability and experience, which would acquir terial ability and experience, which would acquire confidence for the government, and give to it determined energy. The President seems, patriotically disposed; he sees, too, the right course to be pursued in the administration of affairs, but he hesitates and procrastinates; he feels the weakness of his power, and the people know it. He is evidently not the man for a great crisis, and the affairs of Mexico have certainly reached one.

They clearly denote the general desire of the British people to see the present difficulties between the two countries peacefully and honorably adjusted. Nevertheless the European times does not attempt to conceal the fact that formidable obstacles are in the way. Let us hope that they will all be removed, and that a happy terminatian of our, existing controversies with England may lay the foundation for a lasting peace.—Baltimore American.
