INTERESTING FROM THE "DIGGINGS." We have before us a number of additional letters from California, all confirmatory of the previous accounts of the abundance of gold in that territory.

We arrived here on the 9th of last month.—The weather for the last month has been delightful, very much like our finest October weather at home.

It is impossible for persons at a distance to realize the state of affairs here. Gold is the only subject discussed. It is bought and sold in grocers' scales.

They offer \$50 a month and cannot get men at that; the usual wages were about \$12. Those who reap most in this golden harvest are the small traders;

GRAIN.—The demand for Wheat is light, and prices are nominal at \$1.10 a 1.12 per bu. for good Reds, and \$1.15 for prime White.

SEEDS.—The market for Clover remains quiet, sales being confined to some small lots of new at \$3.75 a \$4 per bushel.
