Resolved by the Senate and House of Repre-Accorded by the Serials and House of Represident is General Assembly met: That the Constitution of this Commonwealth be smended in the second section of the fifth stille, so that it shall read as follows: The Judges of the Supreme Court, of the Several Courts of Common Pleas, and of such other Courts of Record as are or shall be established by 1st, shall be elected by the qualified electors of the Commonwealth a large. The Fresident Judges of the several Courts of Record as are or shall be catablished by 1st, shall be elected by the qualified electors of the Commonwealth at large. The Fresident Judges of the several Courts of Common Pleas and of such other Courts of Record as are or shall be established by 1st, and all other Judges required to be lea ned in the 1st, by the qualified electors of the respective districts over which they are to preside or act as Judges. And the Associate Judges of the Courts of Common Pleas by the qualified ectors of the Counties respectively.
