GENERAL ELECTION.

SHERIFF'S PROCLAMATION.

PURSUANT to an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," passed on the 15th day of July, 1848, I, M. CROWNOVER, Sheriff of the county of Huntingdon, in the State of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the county aforesaid, that a General Election will be held in said county of Huntingdon, on the SECOND TUESDAY (8th day) OF OCTOBER, 1850, at which time State and County officers, as follows, will be elected:

ONE PERSON to fill the office of Canal Commissioner of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

ONE PERSON to fill the office of Auditor General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

ONE PERSON to represent the counties of Huntingdon, Blair, Centre, Juniata and Millin, in the Congress of the United States.

ONE PERSON to represent the counties of Huntingdon and Blair, in the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

ONE PERSON to fill the office of Sheriff of the county of Huntingdon.

ONE PERSON to fill the office of Commissioner of the county of Huntingdon.

ONE PERSON to fill the office of District Attorney of the county of Huntingdon.

ONE PERSON to fill the office of County Surveyor of the county of Huntingdon.

ONE PERSON to fill the office of Auditor of the county of Huntingdon.

Also, that at the time aforesaid, an election will be held for the purpose of deciding upon the adoption or rejection of the proposed amendment of the Constitution of this Commonwealth, relating to the election of Judges by the People, which has been agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each House of the Legislature, at two successive sessions of the same.

And whereas, the Constitution of this Commonwealth requires that any amendment so agreed to shall be submitted to the people in such manner, and at such time, at least three months after being so agreed to by the two Houses, as the Legislature shall prescribe:

And whereas, by an act of the General Assembly of the State, passed on the 9th day of April, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and fifty, it is provided "that for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the citizens of the Commonwealth, in regard to the adoption or rejection of the said amendment, the Governor of this Commonwealth shall issue a writ of election directed to the Sheriff of each and every county of this Commonwealth, commanding them to give notice in the usual manner, that an election will be held in each of the townships, wards and districts therein, on the second Tuesday in October, in the year of our Lord 1850, for the purpose of deciding upon the adoption or rejection of the said amendment."

And the freemen of the county of Huntingdon are authorized to vote at said election tickets either printed or written, or partly printed and partly written, labelled on the outside "AMENDMENT," and those who are favorable to said amendment, may express their desire by voting each a written or printed, or partly printed and partly written ballot, containing the words "I vote for the said amendment," and those who are opposed to such amendment may express their opposition by voting each a similar ballot, containing on the inside thereof the words, "against the amendment."

Also, at the time aforesaid, an election will be held for the purpose of deciding for or against the erection of a Poor House by the county of Huntingdon.

In pursuance of said Act, I also hereby make known and give notice that the places of holding the aforesaid general election in the several election districts within the said county, are as follows:

1st district, composed of Henderson township, and all that part of Walker township not in the 16th district, at the Court House in the Borough of Huntingdon.

2d district, composed of Dublin township, at the house of Matthew Taylor, in said township.

3d district, composed of so much of Warriors-mark township as is not included in the 19th district, at the school house adjoining the town of Warriorsmark.

4th district, composed of the township of Hopeville, at the house of Henry Zimmerman, near Eutrek's new mill, in said township.

5th district, composed of the township of Barre, at the house of James Livings, and formerly John Harper, in the town of Sausburg, in said tp.

6th district, composed of the township of Shirley, at the house of D. Fraker, in Shirleyburg.

7th district, composed of Porter and Walker townships, and so much of West township as is included in the following boundaries, to wit: beginning at the south-west corner of Tobias Kaufman's farm on the bank of the river, in the north-east corner of Jackson's narrows, thence in a north-easterly direction to the most southerly part of the farm owned by Michael Maguire, thence north 40 degrees west to the top of Tussey's mountain, to intersect the line of Franklin township, thence along said line to the place of beginning, at the public school house opposite the German Bet. Church, in the Borough of Alexandria.

8th district, composed of the township of Franklin, at the house of Jacob Matern, now occupied by Geo. W. Matern, in said township.

9th district, composed of Tell township, at the Union School House, near the Union Meeting House, in said township.

10th district, composed of Springfield township, at the school house near Hugh Moulden's, in said township.

11th district, composed of Union tp., at the school house near Ezekiel Corbin's in said township.

12th district, composed of Brady township, at the mill of James Lane, in said township.

13th district, composed of Morris township, at the house now occupied by Abraham Moyer, (1nn keeper,) late Alex. Lowry, Jr., in the village of Waterstreet, in said township.

14th district, composed of that part of West tp., not included in the 7th district, at the public school house on the farm now owned by Miles Lewis, (formerly owned by James Ennis) in said tp.

15th district, composed of that part of Walker township lying southwest of a line commencing opposite David Corbin's house, at the Union tp., and thence in a straight line, including said Corbin's house to the place of beginning, at the house of Jacob Maguire, in said tp.

16th district, composed of the township of Tod, at the Green School House in said tp.

17th district, composed of that part of West tp. on the south-east side of Warrior ridge, beginning

at the line of West and Henderson townships, at the foot of said ridge, to the line of Barre township, thence by the division line of Barre and West townships to the summit of Stone mountain, to intersect the line of Henderson and West townships, thence by said line to place of beginning, at the house now occupied by Benjamin Corbin, on Murray's Run.

18th district, composed of Cromwell tp., at the house now occupied by David Eitner, Orbisoma.

19th district, composed of the Borough of Birmingham, with the several tracts of land near and attached to the same, now owned and occupied by Thos. M. Owens, John K. McCallan, A. Robertson, John Gensinger and Wm. Gensinger, situated on the farm of Wm. Gensinger, at the public school house in said Borough.

20th district, composed of Cass township, at the public school house in Cassville, in said tp.

21st district, composed of Jackson township, at the house of Robert Barr, now occupied by John Hirst, at McAlary's Fort, in said tp.

22d district, composed of Clay township, at the house of Joshua Shore, at the Three Springs, in said township.

23d district, composed of Penn Township, at the school house on the farm of Jacob Brambaugh, in said township.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 13th section of the aforesaid act I am directed, "that every person, excepting justices of the peace, who shall hold any office or appointment in the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive, or the judiciary department of this State, or of the U. States, or any city or incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the elect or elect under count of any city, commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be then eligible to any office to be then voted for."

Also, that in the 4th section of the act aforesaid entitled "An act relating to executions and for other purposes," approved April 16, 1840, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section "shall not be construed as to prevent any militia officer or borough officer from serving as judge, inspector, or clerk, of any general or special election in this Commonwealth."

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the 6th section in the act aforesaid, the judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate of return of the election of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of one judge from each district, at the Court House in the Borough of Huntingdon, on the third day after the day of the election, being for the present year on FRIDAY, the 11th of October next, then and there to do and perform the duties required by law of said judges.

Also, that where a judge by sickness or other cause, is unable to attend said meeting of judges, then the certificate of return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the inspectors or clerks of the election of said district, and shall do and perform the duties required of said judge unable to attend.

Also, in the 61st section of said act, it is enacted that "every general and special election shall be opened before the hour of eight and ten in the forenoon, and shall continue open until the adjournment or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed."
