

**A Vote to be Remembered.**

In the State Senate, on Thursday, the Appropriation Bill being under consideration, Mr. CAROTHERS moved to amend the 24th section, by reinstating the appropriation of \$10,000 to the Western Pennsylvania Hospital, stricken out by the Senate Committee, which was disagreed to by a vote of yeas 10, nays 20.

Several other motions were made to insert reduced appropriations for the same object, but they were all disagreed to. Mr. MYERS then moved to amend by inserting the division as it stood in the House bill, making an appropriation of \$10,000, one-half to the Western Pennsylvania Hospital, and the remainder to the Sisters of Mercy, of the county of Allegheny. On this motion the yeas and nays were taken, and resulted as follows: YEAS—Messrs. Daily, Hugus, M'Intire, Myers and Morrison—5.

NAYS—Messrs. Brooke, Beckley, Carothers, Carson, Crabbe, Cunningham, Fernon, Frailey, Frick, Felton, Gaenssey, Hoge, Ives, Jones, Konigsmacher, M'Caslin, Malone, Muhlenberg, Packer, Sanderson, Savery, Shimer, Walker and Matthias—Speaker—25.

So the motion was not agreed to, and never was a more shameful proposition negated in a legislative body.

**Mail Robber Arrested.**

We learn that Col. Hottinger, the vigilant agent of the Post Office Department, has arrested Wm. King, formerly deputy postmaster at Brownstown, Butler co., for various mail depredations. He was arrested at Venango, on the 31st ult., and committed for trial before the U. S. Court, which meets in Pittsburg in May.

**Correction.**

A paragraph is going the rounds of the papers, to the effect that Gen. Wm. F. Packer introduced the bill requiring the County Commissioners of every county in the State to preserve a file of each of the county papers not exceeding four and have them bound for future reference. Such a bill has been introduced; but General Packer is not entitled to the credit of it. It was read in place by John B. Packer, Esq., the gentlemanly and efficient member of the House, from Northumberland county.

Such a law will entitle this Legislature to the gratitude of the people in after years.

**RAILROAD IRON.**

The Delaware Gazette states that the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad Company intend relaying the track between Wilmington and Baltimore. For this purpose they have purchased 3000 tons of heavy rail at the Montour Iron Works, in Danville, Pa., and 3000 tons of foreign iron, making 6000 tons in all.
