The Crystal Palace Beater.—Dr. Duff, in his speech at the anniversary meeting of the Wesleyan Missionary Society in London, thus described one of the heathen temples of India:

"In Seringham you have the hugest heathen temple that can probably be found from the North to the South pole. It is a square, each side being a mile in length, so that it is four miles around. Talk of your Crystal Palace! Why, as a man would put a penny in his pocket, you might put your Crystal Palace into the pocket of this huge pagoda. The walls are 25 feet high, and 4 or 5 feet thick, and in the centre of each wall rises a lofty tower. Entering the first square you come to another with a wall as high, and four more towers. Within that square is another, and within that square is The creat hall for nilering is sm. mgu, and four more towthat again is another- cowded by thousands of
Brahmins. The great hall for pilgrims is supported by a thousand pillars, each cut out of a
single block of stone.
