Both were far superior to the usual order of academical exercises, and reflect great credit upon their authors.

The whole passed off to the entire satisfaction of the large audience present, and without a single occurrence to mar the harmony of the occasion.

It is due to Mr. McGinness to say, that by his exertions since the lamentable occurrence which deprived the institution of its head and founder, he has established for himself a high reputation as a teacher, and given to Milwood Academy a character which should, in future, secure it a most liberal patronage.

11th district, composed of Morris township, at the house now occupied by Abraham Moyer, (Inn keeper,) late Alex. Lowry, Jr., in the village of Waterstreet, in said township.

14th district, composed of that part of West tp., not included in the 7th district, at the public school house on the farm now owned by Miles Lewis, (formerly owned by James Brink), in said tp.

15th district, composed of that part of Walker township lying south-west of a line commencing opposite David Corbin's house, at the Union tp., line, thence in a straight line, including said Corbin's house to the corner of Porter township, on the Huntingdon and Woodcock valley road, at the house of Jacob Magaly, in said tp.

16th district, composed of the township of Tod, at the Green School House in said tp.

17th district, composed of that part of West tp., on the south-east side of Warriors-ridge, beginning at the line of West and Henderson townships, at the foot of said Ridge, to the line of Barree township, thence by the division line of Barree and West townships to the summit of Stone mountain, to intersect the line of Henderson and West townships, thence by said line to place of beginning, at the house now occupied by Benjamin Corbin, on Murry's Run.

18th district, composed of Cromwell tp., at the house now occupied by David Emire, Orishonia.

19th district, composed of the Borough of Birmingham, with the several tracts of land near to and attached to the same, now owned and occupied by Thos. M. Owens, John K. McCahan, A. Robinson, John Gensimer and Wm. Gensimer, situate in the township of Warriors-mark, at the public school house in said Borough.

20th district, composed of Cass township, at the public school house in Cassville, in said tp.

21st district, composed of Jackson township, at the house of Robert Barr, now occupied by John Hirst, at McAleavy's Fort, in said tp.

22nd district, composed of Clay township, at the house of Joshua Shore, at the Three Springs, in said township.

23rd district, composed of Penn Township, at the school house on the farm of Jacob Brumbaugh, in said township.

I also make known and give notice, as in and by the 13th section of the aforesaid act I am directed, "that every person, excepting justices of the peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the U. States, or of this State, or of any city, or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under this legislative, executive, or the judiciary department of this State, or of the U. States, or any city or incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, commissioners of an incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding or exercising at the same time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be then eligible to any office to be then voted for."

Also, that in the 14th section of the act of Assembly entitled "An act relating to executions and for other purposes," approved April 16, 1840, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section "shall not be construed as to prevent any militia officer or non-commissioned officer from serving as judge, inspector, or clerk, or any general of special election in this Commonwealth."

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the 67th section in the act aforesaid, the judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate or return of the election of their respective districts, and give notice, that the certificate of one judge from each district, at the Court House in the Borough of Huntingdon, on the third day after the day of the election, being for the present year on FRIDAY, the 17th of October next, then and there to do and perform the duties required by law of said judges. Also, that where a judge by sickness or unavoidable accident, is unable to attend said meeting of judges, then the certificate of return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the inspectors or clerks of the election of said district, and shall do and perform the duties required of said judge unable to attend.

Also, in the 61st section of said act it is enacted that "every general and special election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed."
