Railroad Project.

A new and gigantic railroad enterprise is in contemplation, looking to the establishment of a direct, six feet guage railroad between the cities of New York and Cincinnati. The Gezette of the latter city speaks of it as follows:

A project is on foot, and is pressed with great earnestness by Eastern capitalists, as well as by many enterprising citizens in Ohio, to construct a line of Railway from Olean, New York, through Pennsylvania and Ohio, to connect with lines leading to Indiana and to Cincinnati, at some suitable point in Ohio. This track to connect with the New York and Erie Road at Olean, and to be a six foot track, so as to open an unbroken wide guage from New York to this city. The proposed line, as we understand it, passes down the Valley of the Alleghany say to Warren, Pa., thence in to Ohio by Warren and Ravena, and on to intersect the Pennsylvania and Ohio Road at Wooster or Mansfield, branching, southwest to this city. Should this line strike Wooster or Loudonville, it will, probably take the route through Mount Vernon, Delaware and Springfield in this direction, and will make a pretty direct route from this city to Olean.

This is an important project, and we are informed that it is based on existing charters in Ohio (granted).

We are not now able to refer to the precise prevision of the charters alluded to, or to give their dates or titles; but we suppose that the whole extent of the proposed line within the State of New York, and for some considerable distance within the State of Pennsylvania, will be over the route of the Allegheny Valley road, from Pittsburgh to Olean, and within Ohio, will pass some thirty or forty miles south of the Lakershore in the Western Reserve, diverging gradually farther south. Should the St. Louis track be laid on the wide guage, it may happen that a continuous line of wide guage road may connect the cities of St. Louis, Cincinnati, and New York.
