PROCLAMATION OF GENERAL ELECTION.

URSURANT to an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An act relating to the elections of this Commonwealth," approved the second day of July A. D. 1839, J. W. B. ZEIGLER, High Sheriff of the county of Huntington, in the State of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the county aforesaid, that a General Election will be held in said county of Huntington, on the **Second Tuesday (11th day) of October, 1853,** at which time State and County officers, as follows, will be elected:

ONE PERSON to fill the office of Canal Commissioner of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
ONE PERSON to fill the office of Supreme Judge of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
ONE PERSON to fill the office of Auditor General of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
ONE PERSON in connection with the counties of Huntington, Blair and Cambria, to fill the office of State Senator of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

TWO PERSONS to represent the counties of Huntington and Blair in the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
ONE PERSON to fill the office of Sheriff for the county of Huntington.
ONE PERSON to fill the office of Treasurer for the county of Huntington.
ONE PERSON to fill the office of Director of the Poor for the county of Huntington.
ONE PERSON to fill the office of Auditor for the county of Huntington.

In pursuance of said Act, I also hereby make known and give notice, that the places of holding the aforesaid general election in the several election districts within the said county, are as follows:

1st district, composed of Henderson township, and all that part of Walker township not in the 16th district, at the Court House in the Borough of Huntington.
2d district, composed of Dublin township, at the house of Mathew Taylor, in said township.
3d district, composed of so much of Warriorsburg township as is included in the 13th district at the School House adjoining the town of Warriorsburg.

15th district, composed of that part of Walker township lying east of a line commencing opposite to David Corbin's house in the Union tp., thence in a straight line, including said Corbin's house to the corner of Porter tp., on the Huntington and Woodcock valley road, at the house of Jacob Magly in said tp.

16th district, composed of the township of Tod at the Green School House in said tp.

S., or any city or incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress and the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, commissioners of any incorporated district, or any incapable of holding or exercising at the same time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be then eligible to any office to be then voted for."

Also, that in the 14th section of the act of Assembly entitled an "Act relating to executions and for other purposes," approved April 16, 1840, it is enacted that the aforesaid 13th section "shall not be construed as to prevent any militia officer or borough officer from serving as judge, inspector, or clerk, or any general or special election in any city or township, or in any city or incorporated district, who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or the judiciary department of this State, or of the U. S., or any city or incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress and the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, commissioners of any incorporated district, or any incapable of holding or exercising at the same time, the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge, or other officer of any such election, shall be then eligible to any office to be then voted for."
