A LOCOMOTIVE BLOWN TO PIECES. TWO MEN KILLED.

Toll-House Shattered and Set on Fire.

This morning, about half past four o'clock, a frightful explosion took place in the Twenty fourth ward. At the hour named the engine Perklemen one of the largest on the Reading railroad, had reached the toll-house on the west end of the Schuylkill at the Falls bridge.

The locomotive was broken away from the rest of the train by the force of the explosion, and it was dashed on the bridge, a distance of sixty or seventy feet. The engine was literally blown to pieces, and the boiler being shattered and even the running gear wrecked.

Two men were instantly killed by the accident. The engineer, Josiah Missetman, was upon the engine at the time, and it is supposed that he was blown into the river, as no trace has yet been found of his body.

The toll-house at the west end of the bridge was shattered by the explosion and the building was set on fire. The toll-gatherer and his family were in their bed at the time. The toll-gatherer was thrown from his bed by the shock and dashed against the wall.
