All officers whose fees are by this act, and by the act, entitled, "An act establishing a fee bill," passed the twenty-eighth March, eighteen hundred and fourteen, ascertained, limited and appointed, shall and are hereby required to make air tables of their respective fees according to the said acts, and to publish and keep up the same in their respective offices within six months ofter the passing of this act, in some conspicuous part, for the inspection of all persons who shall have business in said offices; and if any such officer shall neglect to publish and keep up a table of the fees of his office as aforesaid, in such case, such officer shall pay to any person aggrieved the sum of TEN DOLLARS, together with double the amount of the excess of fees, if any, which such person may have paid to the said officer, to be ecovered with costs of suit by action of debt. in the same manner as other debts are by law recov-


