WHAT the provisions of the 13th and 14th Sections of the Act relating to the Support and Employment of the Poor will be enforced against any house-keeper who shall receive into his house any person not having a legal settlement within this Commonwealth, and who shall neglect to give the notice required by said act. The following are the sections referred to:--viz: SECTION 13. It shall be the duty of every house-keeper who shall receive into his house any person who has not gained a legal settlement in some part of this Commonwealth, (all mariners coming into this Commonwealth, and every other healthy person coming from a foreign country immediately into this Commonwealth only excepted,) within ten days after receiving such person, to give notice thereof in writing, to the overseers of proper district.

SECTION 14. If any house-keeper shall fail to give notice as aforesaid, and if the person so received shall become poor and unable to maintain himself, and cannot be removed to the place of his last legal settlement in any other state, if any such he hath, such house-keeper shall be obliged to provide for and maintain such poor person, and in case of the death of such poor person without leaving wherewithal to defray the expense of his funeral, such house-keeper shall pay the overseers so much as they shall reasonably expend for such purpose.

Governor's Proclamation. PENNSYLVANIA, SS.

IN THE NAME and by the Authority of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:

By Joseph Ritner, Governor of the said Commonwealth.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, The Legislature has adjourned without making any provision for carrying on the Internal Improvements of the State, or for paying the laborers for the work actually under contract, and for which the faith of the State is pledged: AND WHEREAS, Contractors may become alarmed and abandon the work, to their own great loss, the distress of the workmen, and the manifest injury of the Commonwealth, unless the true situation and amount of the means at the disposal of the proper officers for their payment, should be made known. Therefore I have thought proper to make the following statement of the unexpended appropriations, applicable to the public works during the present season, viz:

As the contingency will, in all probability, occur on which the negotiation of the loan just mentioned was directed, viz: The expenditure of the appropriation by the act of February, 1836, before any further means for the continuation of the works specified, shall be provided by the Legislature, it will become the duty of the Executive, to obtain the money, and apply it to the intended object.

If all the foregoing sums should be exhausted before the day fixed for the meeting of the next Legislature, I shall deem it my duty immediately after the next General Election, to take such further steps as may then appear necessary and proper, to provide means to sustain the faith of the Commonwealth and the interests of our great system of Internal Improvement.

In the mean time, contractors, workmen, and others, may fearlessly proceed in the fulfillment of the contracts made according to law, with the agents of the State, assured that means will be provided for the redemption even of her implied faith, and that Pennsylvania will not only complete her system, but also promptly discharge all just claims upon her credit & her honor. Given under my Hand and the Great Seal of the State, at Harrisburg, the fifth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-seven, and of the Commonwealth the sixty-first.
