**MICHIGAN.**—The Legislature of this State adjourned on the 22d ult. after a session of ten days. They have passed a law allowing all the banks in the State to suspend specie payments for one year from the 15th of May last. An act has also been passed providing that, in case of lands to be sold on mortgages heretofore given for the payment of the purchase money, the mortgagee, &c. may have the right of redemption within one year from the time of sale, upon paying to the purchaser the sum bid, and ten per cent. interest thereon. An act providing for an election of a member of Congress for this State, to be held on the 21st and 22d days of August next, has also been passed.
