

> Of the one thousand and twenty seven townships, wards and boroughs now in the State, each in * aded to four a Common School district, eight hundred and seventy: five have accepted the Common School System, and have it in operation, and seven. hundred and eighty six have received their portions of the State appropriation for the present school year, commencing on the first Monday of Jone lust. The number of accepting districts goes on steadily increasing, and the usefulness and economy of the system where fairly tested, are becoming every day more apparent.

All that now seems requisite to the complete success of the System is, that some immediate and officient means be adopted for the preparation of Common School teachers. This subject was fully explained in the last annual Report of the Superintendent, and will be again embraced in a revised draft of the whole School Law which to him for Subscription, Job Work, that officer will shortly lay before you.

I would also recommend that the power of School Directors on the subject of taxution, be curtailed. When they were by law authorized to assess a school tax, equal to thrice the amount of State appropriation coming to the District for the year, the whole amount of appropriation was only half what it now is. Perhaps absolute power of taxation in Directors to that amount, was then necessary; but it is not at present. I would therefore recommend effectually to prevent the highly improper that Directors shall not, hereafter, in any case, impose more tax on their District than a sum equal to its portion of state appropriation, unless by consent of the people, in the same manner as additional school tax is
