COUNTY APPEALS.

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, approved the 15th day of April, A. D. 1834, entitled 'An Act relating to County Rates and Levies', the undersigned, Commissioners of Adams County, will proceed and attend to hear Appeals, for the several townships, from all persons who may apply for redress, in accordance with the directions of said act, and will grant such relief and make such corrections as to them shall appear just and reasonable. The Boards of Appeal will be held in the following order, at which times and places the several Assessors will attend for their respective Townships, viz:—

For the Townships of Hamiltonban, Liberty and Freedom, on Monday the 5th day of October next, at the house of Isaac Robinson, in Millerstown.

For the Townships of Straban, and Cumberland, and the Borough of Gettysburg, on Tuesday the 6th day of October next, at the Commissioners, Office in Gettysburg.

For the Townships of Germany, Mountjoy and Conowago, on Wednesday the 7th day of October next, at the house of James Davis, in Littlestown.

For the Townships of Berwick, Mount Pleasant, and Hamilton, on Thursday the 8th day of October next, at the house of John Miley, in Oxford.

For the Townships of Reading, Huntingdon and Lattimore, on Friday the 9th day of October next, at the house of Moses Myers, in Petersburg.

For the Townships of Menallen, Franklin and Tyrone, on Saturday the 10th day of October next, at Burkholder's Tavern, in Menallen Township.

The Commissioners, for the information of all interested, make known that by an Act of Assembly aforesaid, the Commissioners are bound not to 'make any allowance, or abatement in the valuation of any real estate, in any other year than that in which the triennial assessment, is made, excepting where buildings or other improvements have been destroyed, subsequently to such triennial assessment, and in cases of personal property, offices, professions, trades and occupations, where there has been any alterations in the assessment, occasioning a different valuation from the former year, and also where persons have come to inhabit in the county since such triennial assessment,' and that no notice in the two years succeeding the triennial assessment is to be given to the taxable inhabitants aforesaid, but in the latter recited cases only.

WHEREAS, in and by an Act of the General Assembly of this State, entitled 'An Act to regulate the General Elections of this Commonwealth,' enacted on the second day of July, 1838, it is enjoined on me to give Public Notice of such Election to be held, and to enumerate in such Notice what Officers are to be elected: I, GEORGE W. M'CLELLAN, Sheriff of the county of Adams, do therefore hereby make and give this PUBLIC NOTICE, to the Electors of the said County of Adams that a

GENERAL ELECTION

Will be held in the said County on the Second Tuesday of October next, (the 13th)

at the several Districts composed of the following townships, viz: In the First District, composed of the Borough of Gettysburg, and the township of Cumberland, at the Court-house in Gettysburg.

In the Second District, composed of the township of Germany, at the house now occupied by Alfred Cole, in the town of Littlestown, in the township of Germany.

In the Third District, composed of that part of the township of Barwick, not included in the 15th district, at the house of John Miley, Esq. in the town of Oxford.

In the Fourth District, composed of the township of Lattimore, and that part of Huntingdon township not included in the 11th District at the House of Mr. Underwood, in the township of Huntingdon.

In the Fifth District, composed of the townships of Hamiltonban and Liberty, at the public school house in Millerstown.

In the Sixth District, composed of the township of Hamilton, at the house now occupied by Jacob Bushey, in the town of Berlin.

In the Seventh District, composed of the township of Menallen, at the house of Capt. J. Burkholder, in said township.

In the Eighth District, composed of the township of Straban, at the house occupied by Philip Shriver, in Hunterstown.

In the Ninth District, composed of the township of Franklin, at the house now occupied by Henry Hartman, in said township.

In the Tenth District, composed of the township of Conowago, at the house of Adam Oaster, in M'Sherrystown.

In the Eleventh District, composed of the township of Tyrone, and all that part of Huntingdon township south of the road leading from East Berlin to Carlisle, and east of the State road, including all the voters residing contiguous to said State road at the house of Frederick Bowers, in Heidelberg, in Tyrone township.

In the Twelfth District, composed of the township of Mountjoy, at the house of Mrs. Larimer, in said township.

In the Thirteenth District, composed of the township of Mountpleasant, at the house of Anthony Smith, in said township, situate at the cross roads, the one leading from Oxford to the Two Taverns—the other from Hunterstown to Hanover.

In the Fourteenth District, composed of the township of Reading, at the Public School house in the town of Hampton.

In the Fifteenth District composed of the Borough of Berwick, and that part of Berwick township, ONLY, included within the following limits, to wit: beginning where the Hanover and Petersburg turnpike crosses the York county line, thence along said turnpike to the place where the road from Berlin to Oxford crosses the said turnpike, thence along the said Oxford road, until it intersects the new road from George Mummer's farm on the said Oxford road, thence along said road to the York county line, near David Hollinger's saw-mill, thence along said York county line to place of beginning; at the Public School-house in Abbotstown.

The Sixteenth District, composed of the township of Freedom, at the house of Nicholas Moritz, in said township.

AT WHICH TIME AND PLACES WILL BE ELECTED

One Member of Congress, to represent the district composed of the counties of Adams and Franklin; Two Representatives in the State Legislature, for the County of Adams; One County Commissioner; One Auditor of Public Accounts; and One Director of the Poor & House of Employment of the County of Adams.

And in and by an Act of the General Assembly of this State, passed on the 2d day of July, 1839, it is directed that the INSPECTORS and JUDGES be at the places of their Districts on the day of the General Election, aforesaid, at 9 o'clock, in the forenoon, to do and perform the several duties required and enjoined on them in and by the same Act.

Also—in and by virtue of the 13th Section of the Act aforesaid, every person, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States or of this State, or of any city, or incorporated district, whether a commissioner, officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is, or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary department of this State, or of the United States, or of any city or incorporated district, and also that every Member of Congress, and of the State Legislature, and of the Select or Common Council of any city, or Commissioners of any incorporated district is by law incapable of holding or exercising, at the same time, the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no Judge, Inspector, or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for.

And it is further directed, in and by the Act of the General Assembly of this State aforesaid, that one of the JUDGES of each of the different Districts, aforesaid, who shall have the charge of the certificate of the number of votes which shall have been given for each Candidate for the different offices then and there voted for at their respective Districts, shall meet on the third day after the Election, which shall be on Friday the 16th of October aforesaid, at the Court house in the Borough of Gettysburg, then and there to make a fair statement and certificate of the number of votes which shall have been given at the different Districts in the county of Adams, for any person or persons for the offices aforesaid, &c.

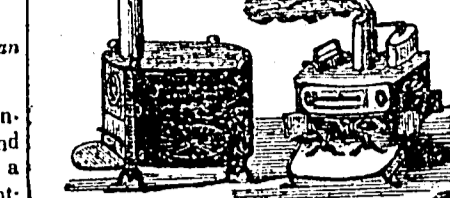
