HARRISBURG, Feb. 23, 1841. The amount of tax every district must levy to entitle itself to its share of State ap propriation is a sum equal to at least sixty cents for every taxable inhabitant in the district, according to the last triennial enumeration made in the spring of 1839. A list of taxables in each district is hereto appended.

Districts that have already accepted the Common School system, and received their share of the appropriation for former years, will on levying the proper amount of tax, be entitled under existing laws to receive for the school year 1842, which commences on the first Monday of next June, one dollar for every taxable.

Districts which have not received any part of the appropriation of former years but which accept the system for the first time, at the annual election in March next, and levy the proper amount of tax, will under existing laws receive \$4 40 for every taxable in the district in 1835, and \$3 00 for every taxable in 1839, according to the annexed list.
