Robberiss, to use plain language, unparal relief. even though he never subscribed for it. His duty in such case is not to take the paper from the office or place where it is left, but to notify the publisher that he does not wish it. If papers are sent to a post office, store, tavern, or other place, and are not taken by the person to whom they are sent, the postmaster, store or tavern keeper. &c., is responsible for the payment unless he immediately gives notice to the aphlisher that they are not taken from the office or place where they are sent. Extract from the Post Office Regulations, nage 50, section 118:

"In every instance in which papers that come to your office are not taken out by the person to whom they are sent, you will give immediate notice of it to the publisher, adding the reasons, if known, why the papers are not taken out."

### REMITTANCES BY MAIL.

TROM THE POSTMASTER GENERAL. "A Postmaster may enclose money in a letter to the publisher of a newspaper, to pay the subser plin of a third person, and frank the letter, if written by himself."

IPNOTE. - Some subscribers may not be aware of the above regulation. It will be seen that, by requesting any postmaster to frank their letters conaining money, he will do so upon being satisfied that the letters contain nothing but what refers to the subscription.


