3d. The inconvenience of frequent renewals is avoided by insuring for a term of five years. 4th. Any person applying for insurance must give his premium note for the cheapest class at the rate of 5 per centum, which will be \$50 on the \$1000, for which he will have to pay \$2 50 for five years, and \$1 50 for survey and policy. and no more unless loss be sustained to a greater amount than the funds on hand will cover, and then no more will be required than a pro rata share. These rates are much cheaper than those of other companies, except such as are incorpora-
