A Man Under a Load of Saw-Logs.—Perilous Position and Singular Escape.—Mr. D. B. Brown, of this village, assisted by Mr. J. Parker, of Homer, was engaged in unloading a load of wood near his shop on Monday afternoon last, when they heard a sudden crash against the fence along the "dug-way" which enters the village from the North, and on looking up saw a team of horses struggling with a sled-load of saw-logs, which had slipped partly off the road and turned over, the hind-end resting against the fence, which had broken down. In a moment more they heard a man scream as if in great pain; they started immediately for the scene of the accident, alarming the neighbors on the way, and on reaching the place they found the driver, a young man named Henry Moore, from near Olean, N. Y., (who is hauling logs for Mr. B. S. Cudwell,) lying on the fence, with one end of the smallest of the three logs lying across the calves of his legs, and a larger one resting immediately over his back, but not quite touching it, it being firmly held with the other three by the hind leading chain. His position was one of great pain and peril, but he was soon extricated, by Mr. Brown and others, having received no more serious injury than a pretty severe squeezing of his legs. He was taken to his boarding house, Mr. Nelson Clark's, a couple of miles from the village, where we learn that he is doing well. The warm weather had thawed away the road considerably, and the almost constant passing of the log-sleds had worn it off so as to render its travel perilous even to unloaded sleighs.

It will be well for the people of this county to refuse the notes of the Tioga County Bank, as most of our merchants and brokers will not receive them.—Meadville Spirit of the Age.

The above named bank is one of those chartered last winter. We have not before heard that its notes were discredited, and cannot see why the Meadville sharers will not take it. Peterson's Detector for January quotes it at 1 1/2 per cent. discount, while the Crawford County Bank is marked doubtful. Meadville sharers should take their own money good before they discredit the Banks of other communities. Though we are not directly interested in the welfare of the Tioga Bank, as a neighbor we feel under obligations to say that its notes are, so far as we know, as good as those of any country bank in the State, very few of them being circulated—and from our knowledge of those who have its shares in their hands, we think there is reason to suppose that its notes will be current while those of any country bank are.
