The selection is a most excellent one, and we trust she will be enabled to make a good report to the State Vice-Regent of her efforts among our citizens, and that their patriotism may be exhibited in creditable donations to so worthy a cause.

No Summer Vacation at the Iron City College, Pittsburg, Pa., owing to the improved prospects for active business throughout the entire country this coming fall. Upwards of 200 Students are in daily attendance; hence the entire faculty is retained, and there will be no summer vacation, giving every facility for young men to enter during the summer, and be thoroughly prepared, at a cost of only \$40, in time for the business season.

Clouds Burst.—During the heavy rain on Thursday afternoon last, two clouds met, burst and fell with perfect currents of water—not rain—in Hebron township, near this village. An eyewitness says that a 14-quart pail, standing in the open air, was rained full in 25 minutes. Logs two feet in diameter, laying out of usual water courses, were carried off, so rapidly did the water rise, the dam of Mr. Nelson Clark's mill, was carried away by the sudden flood, and at the steam saw-mill of Mr. Wm. H. Metzger, on another stream, a milk house was carried away, and a large amount of driftwood floated into the mill, so that several days will be required to get the mill in running order. The crops in the neighborhood are said to have been very little injured.

In all other localities from which we have heard the rain has started vegetation forward with a new impetus, and everywhere there is new hope that the sad effects of the great frost will be in a great measure overcome.

Celebration at Germania.—The annual visit of the members of the Pennsylvania (German) Land Association to their large and flourishing colony in Abbott township, this county, was made the occasion of a "good time generally" by them on Monday last. The energetic and genial local agent, Mr. Alex. Eydyan, invited our citizens generally, as far as could make the invitation known in consequence of the shortness of the time had to do it in, and a number of them, including our Brass Band. We regret that it was extremely inconvenient for us to have been there. As the party did not return in time for us to get a full report from our special reporter for the occasion, we defer it until our next. The good feeling manifested by the Germanians towards our citizens, is highly appreciated by them, judging them by their remarks. We hope it may never diminish on either side.

A free dinner, at the expense of the association and provided by Mr. Anderson Jackson, (formerly of this place, and "mine host" of the Germania Hotel,) was partaken of by about 400 guests, in a room prepared for that purpose.

Leg Broken in a Swing.—On Sunday morning last, the driver of the Wellsville stage, a lad about 17 years old, named William Addison, hailing from Olean, was met with a sad accident. He, while several boys of about his age, was swinging in a rope swing erected on the bank, the other side of the river, when several boys took hold of the cords attached to the main swing to give it motion, and drew the swing (in which he was seated alone) as far back as they could,

and then let it go again, which would give the swing great velocity and width of range. They had drawn it back and the word was given to let go, and several of the boys did so; but one or two, more devilish than wise, hung to the cord, bringing the swing around against one of the trees to which it was attached, and with so much force as to break Addison's right thigh bone entirely off about half way between his knee and hip joint. He jumped out of the swing and was first aware that his leg was broken when on striking the ground the leg flew up into his face. A lounge was brought from the residence of H. H. Dent, near by, on which he was carried to Glassmire's Hotel, where the bone was set by Drs. Jeorg and Ellison, and the boy is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances. The boy says he is parentless, and has not a friend living in the world. Our philanthropic citizens will not permit him to want for necessary comforts while he is here. This was his second trip as driver of the stage. We trust the accident will check, in some measure at least, the foolish and somewhat malicious mischief-making propensity of those who are to a great extent blameable for its commission.
