A Dealer informs us that about 1,200 feet of good Cherry Lumber will be cut from this place to Ocean this season—making 188 wagon loads of 800 feet each. This is rather a new branch of trade here, and will be likely to be very important, one another year.

Frost.—A light frost was visible in the valleys of this county on Tuesday morning, but so far as we can learn no damage to growing crops was sustained. The weather has been remarkably cold since Saturday last, but a warmer change is noticeable this (Wednesday) morning.

It will be seen that additional premiums are offered, and that the committees of Judges are more comprehensive than they were last year. Persons receiving a copy of this number of the Journal will do well to preserve it, as they may not so easily get hold of the premium list again. The Orator for the session has not yet been engaged, we believe.

Brilliant Aurora Borealis.—The astronomical display witnessed last Sunday night was the most brilliant and peculiar ever witnessed perhaps by any of the recent living generations, except those who have seen them in their far northern haunts. As we are not good at describing such things, we extract the following description of the event from a lengthy article in the N. Y. Eccl. Post of Monday night, and which was evidently written by a versed in such matters. The extract we make is somewhat lengthy, but will found worthy of the space it occupies our columns:

"The day previous had been unusually cool for the season, and the sky cloudy. It rained for a short time during the middle of the day, but in the afternoon the buds dispersed, and the sun set in unclouded brilliancy.

"It was observed that the twilight appeared of unusual length. About eight o'clock it was perceived that the prolonged light, instead of being the legacy of the sun, emanated from a singular luminous cloud that swept in a long trail of fire light across the western part of the heavens, extending half way to the zenith. The stars were not visible through the denser part of this cloud, which retained its position and appearance for some time, then gradually shifted, and extended, assuming new phases of beauty.

"At about 9 o'clock the atmospheric display seemed to reach its culmination, and its aspect as seen from elevated positions and house-tops commanding a full view of the horizon on all sides, was such as to arouse the most overpowering emotions. At the zenith, directly above the spectator, appeared a large circle of white and red, dotted with stars, while from its coronet radiated in every direction beams and currents of quivering light, both white and red. Most of these shoots of light were transparent, and the stars beyond beamed through with unobstructed beauty. To the east and to the west huge fields of luminous clouds, tinted with a bright rosy flush, wholly unlike that produced by the rising sun, and, if possible, even more beautiful. For some minutes this climax remained. The ruby crown, gemmed and fringed by sparkling stars, retained its proud position in the zenith, and the tremulous waves of light floated and quivered downwards like some imperial train waded by the cool night winds. At times it suggested a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, bound at the wrist with a bracelet of ruby and diamond, with the open palm held as if in benediction over the earth, while the fingers of light reached almost to the distant horizon.

"Soon, as Eyrelet has beautifully spoken of a somewhat similar scene, 'the bands of angels shifted the glorious scenery of the heavens.' The mass of apparent red clouds to the east moved away southward, gradually fading, while the corresponding red clouds on the west seemed to sink into a chaos of dark cloud that, with a fringe of blue, skirted the western horizon.

While these changes were taking place in the east and west, the wondrous crown above moved a few degrees and then gradually faded. Flashes of light covering many degrees slowly condensed into a mighty luminous cloud, with its top near the zenith. This cloud, gradually altering its shape, assumed forms both singular and suggestive.

"At one time it bore a striking resemblance to an eagle, and then, the slightest, almost imperceptible change, transformed it into a tortoise. Then again, it seemed to sweep across the heavens presenting the appearance of a ghastly shroud, and reminding one of the dim heroes of Ossian. For about half an hour these remarkable changes took place, and then the lights gradually disappeared. In a short time, however, they were resumed. Sheets of the same white luminous cloud again illuminated the sky, producing about the same amount of light as the full moon, and the night became almost as the day."
